"Should the South Bay area form a separate county?"

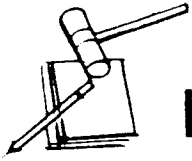
SPEAKER: J.M. WALKER
Chairman, SOUTH BAY COUNTY COMMITTEE

Is secession a reasonable answer to high taxes? Would a new county in our area provide better services at lower cost? Mr. J. M. Walker, chairman of the committee to form a new and separate county government in the South Bay area, will address the October meeting on that subject.

Walker's aim in forming the county is primarily to reduce taxes. His committee believes that the cost of county government could be cut from the over \$4 now to about \$2 per hundred. The committee observes that the South Bay area pays 6% of the total L.A. County property tax but contains only 3% of the population, and that the incorporated cities are paying for duplicated county services.

Is the formation of a new county the right answer? You'll have your chance to ask questions of Mr. Walker at the meeting so if and when this issue comes to a vote you'll be informed on costs, county services, and other pros and cons of the issue. The October meeting will be the Riviera's best opportunity to find out about this issue which may well have significant impact on future tax bills and other aspects of county affairs.

Letter from the President

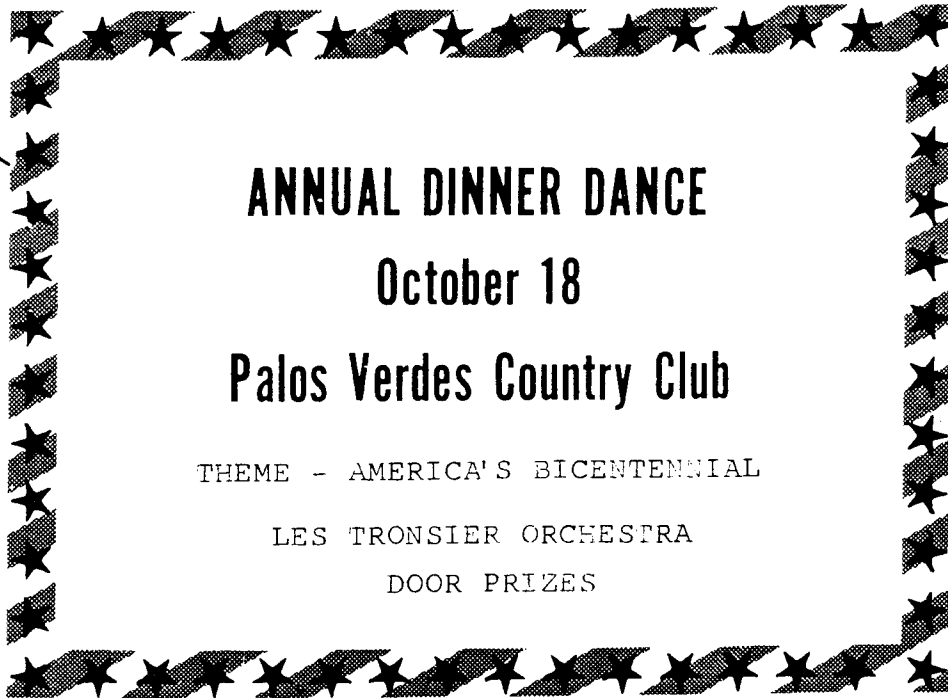
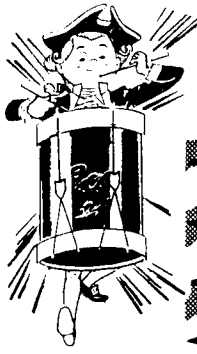
One of the advantages of a smaller town is that the residents can generally feel a "sense of community", that is...a feeling of community opinion or attitude.
